1. Our School Vision and Theological Foundation

At Woodmansey Church of England Primary School, collective worship sits at the heart of our identity as a Christian community. It is the daily rhythm that nurtures spiritual flourishing, connects us to our theological vision and shapes the way pupils and adults live out our values.

Our vision:

Building Strong Foundations — Unlocking Potential — Inspiring a Generation

This vision is rooted in biblical texts:

- Matthew 7:24–25 — Building Strong Foundations
- John 10:10 — Unlocking Potential
- 1 Timothy 4:12 — Inspiring a Generation

Collective worship enables children and adults to notice the presence of God in the world, reflect deeply on meaning and purpose, and respond with compassion, courage and hope.

This is aligned with our whole-school spirituality model:

Notice → Reflect → Respond.

2. Legal Requirements

Collective worship is provided daily for all pupils, in accordance with the Education Reform Act 1988 and DfE Circular 1/94. Worship in Church of England schools must be wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian character. Parents retain the right to withdraw their children.

3. The Nature of Worship in Our School

Worship at Woodmansey is:

- Inclusive — everyone belongs and participates with integrity.
- Invitational — pupils may pray, reflect or be still in ways meaningful to them.
- Inspirational — worship motivates compassionate action, deep thinking and courageous advocacy.

4. Aims of Collective Worship

Collective worship aims to:

- Provide opportunities for spiritual growth.
- Root daily life in Christian teaching, scripture and Anglican tradition.
- Promote respect, compassion and hope.
- Deepen understanding of the school vision.
- Encourage silence, stillness and reflection.
- Celebrate the uniqueness of each individual.
- Strengthen community belonging.
- Enable exploration of Self, Others, World & Beauty and Beyond.

5. Structure of Worship

Our worship follows the Anglican pattern:

Gathering – Engaging – Responding – Sending.

1. **Gathering:** a distinctive atmosphere is created through silence, candles, imagery or music.
2. **Engaging:** we explore scripture, stories, themes, drama, video, lived experience and the Church Year using 'I wonder...' questions.
3. **Responding:** pupils are invited to reflect, pray, journal, create or commit to an act of kindness, following our Notice → Reflect → Respond model.
4. **Sending:** worship ends with purpose, offering a final message, blessing or challenge to carry forward.

6. Worship Content and Organisation

Worship includes:

- Whole school worship
- Class worship
- Celebration worship
- Outdoor worship
- Church worship
- Pupil-led worship
- Visitor-led worship

Whole school worship is a special opportunity to come together. For this reason, it is important the tone is set prior to pupils entering the hall.

- All blinds shut
- Curtains to the chair store closed
- Projector screen down and projector on
- Hall lights dimmed
- Two benches at the back for Year 6 in front of the temporary classroom area.
- Chairs positioned down the side for staff to join (minimum of 4)
- Small table at the front to create a focal point with a candle ready to be lit

Throughout the week, worship is led by

- Monday - Theme of the Week
- Tuesday - Roots and Fruits providing theological depth
- Wednesday - World & Community
- Thursday - Theme of the Week and Celebration
- Friday - Picture Book Worships to support spiritual development and Christian values through story.

The worship calendar follows the Christian year, including Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, Pentecost, Trinity and Saints' Days.

To complement this we have a collection of songs which have been chosen to track the rhythm of the year. This can be found in Appendix 1.

We change the colour of our worship cloth to reflect the Church Year.

7. Anglican Distinctiveness

Our Anglican identity is expressed through:

- Use of scripture
- Christian symbols and artefacts
- Lighting and extinguishing candles
- Traditional blessings (in invitational language)
- Celebration of the Church Year
- Partnership with St Peter's Church & Beverley Minster

8. Inclusive Worship Practice

Worship is accessible for all through:

- Multi-sensory experiences
- Creative opportunities
- Clear explanations of Christian traditions
- Invitational prayer
- Support for SEND and emotional needs
- Opportunities for silence and stillness

9. Pupil Leadership in Worship

Pupil leadership deepens understanding of worship. Pupils may:

- Help plan worship
- Lead reflections
- Share readings, drama or prayer
- Prepare the worship space
- Evaluate worship

Participation is always voluntary.

10. Environment and Sacred Spaces

Reflective spaces across school follow Notice → Reflect → Respond. These encourage prayer, stillness and spiritual curiosity.

11. Monitoring and Evaluation

Evaluation includes:

- Pupil voice
- SLT observations
- Governor monitoring
- Planning review

- Visitor feedback
- Review of reflection areas

Evaluation considers how effectively collective worship enables spiritual flourishing and supports pupils in noticing, reflecting and responding to the world around them.

12. Partnerships with Church and Diocese

Worship is enriched through:

- Clergy involvement
- Festivals and services at church
- Diocesan training and resources
- Contributions from the wider Christian community

13. Inclusion, Safeguarding and Wellbeing

Worship respects all beliefs. Prayer is invitational. Language is non-confessional. Worship supports wellbeing, belonging and emotional safety.

14. Withdrawal from Worship

Parents may withdraw their child from worship. A discussion with the Headteacher will be offered. Supervised alternative activities will be provided.

15. Review

This policy will be reviewed every three years, or sooner if required.
